# Message from the **Executive Director**

Welcome to the 14th annual Canadian Sport Film Festival. We are thrilled to have you back with us for CSFF's first inperson screenings since 2019. In the past two years, online options have allowed CSFF to continue screening impactful stories and having important conversations. This year will mark the first time that CSFF has offered both in-person and virtual options for its screenings, broadening the audience for the artists whose films we are proud to share.

The pandemic reaffirmed the importance of sport and recreation to physical health and emotional well being but also reminded us that these benefits are not equally accessible. For many, time in isolation was not free time for recreating. Moreover, Canada's is a sport system in crisis. In a variety of sports, stories of athlete maltreatment, coverups of misconduct, and intransigent and unaccountable leadership have dominated both the news and parliamentary proceedings.

In 2022, those conversations at CSFF focus on girls' and women's access to sporting opportunities and the struggles of diverse peoples to assert their place within sport.


In person and digital screenings begin Friday, November 18.

In attempting to qualify for the 2020 UEFA men's European soccer championship, half of the Israeli National Team players, including the captain, were Muslim. As tensions between Jews and Arabs are stoked by fans and the media, the Muslim players regularly deal with discrimination, being labelled as traitors in the Arab world, and having to prove their loyalty to both team and country.

From modest roots in Waikiki, Duke swam his way to fame, becoming the face of a changing Hawaii and the undisputed father of modern-day surfing. Beyond his legacy as a legendary waterman, Duke was also a racial pioneer, breaking down societal barriers and combating prejudice through sport.

# Category: Woman

Subsequently, international sport governing bodies ruled that targeted female athletes must medically alter their healthy bodies, under the guise of fair play. Today, four champion runners from the Global South fight back against racism, the policing of women's bodies in sport, and the violation of their human rights.
